- [Global Issues in Context](#)
 - Robust and accessible source for analysis of social, political, military, economic, environmental, health and cultural issues. Emphasis on current international news and perspectives. Run a basic search using a country name to locate articles in academic journals, popular magazines from around the world, statistics, news and editorials, and encyclopedic references.
- [Business Source Complete Country Reports](#)
 - Economic information and forecasts can be found using Business Source Complete’s publication search feature. To find country reports, enter a country name in the main search box and select “Country Report” from the Publication Type in the “Limit Your Results” area.
- [Country Watch](#)
 - Country Reviews provide cultural, economic, political, and environmental information and current news articles. Select a country from the Quick Links area on the home page, search on country names, or review intelligence reports. Review specific areas of interest or download entire country reports.

 - Country profiles provide statistical data on that country’s history, geography, people, government, economy, stock exchange and corporate filing practices. Formerly known as Moody’s.

 - To find socioeconomic profiles and news regarding a particular country, select a country from the dropdown list in the Research Countries area on the home page. Information source options include Business Monitor International News, Country Briefings, political risk guides, Walden Country Reports, and recent news.

Recommended Steps

The following steps are recommended for beginning your country research.

- STEP ONE: General review of a country's historical, political, and economic history.
- Identify significant eras, leaders, conflicts, allies, as well as potential internal and external threats.
 - Determine the economic system in operation, key industries driving the national economy, as well as opportunities and obstacles related to economic growth.
 - Assess the country's role in global issues including economic power, dependence on other countries for resources, educational resources, military size and strength, reputation, security issues, and natural resources.
- STEP TWO: Gather information required based on the particular project or assignment.
- Data such as population size and growth or decline, demographics, life expectancy, key economic figures and trends (e.g., GDP, labor force, unemployment rates), foreign investors, energy statistics, and migration.
 - Current news and analysis from within the country as well as external perspectives.
- STEP THREE: Explore content provided.
- Try to verify statistics by using more than one source when possible.
 - Determine how frequently various data are updated.
 - Keep track of significant names, conflicts, and other events as you go.
 - Use acquired information to identify potential news searches.
 - Be conscious of the tone of information as well as the objectivity of the authors.
