Recommended Steps

The following steps are recommended for beginning your Industry research.

STEP ONE: Determine the industry SIC or NAICS code.

- Use the websites provided above or the industry code can also be determined from research databases such as; Hoovers and Standard and Poor's.

STEP TWO: Consider the following points when gathering information:

- Identify types of information required for your assignment or project.
- Industry growth: increasing, declining or stagnate.
- Products or services (current and new).
- Companies that lead the market in revenue and products and services.
- Current trends (economic or technical).
- Future forecast.

- Factors and threats that may affect the industry, such as: natural disaster and political strife.
- Major consumers.
- Major competitors.
- Structure of the industry.

STEP THREE: Compare industry and market data.

- Option A: Use the Factiva Database.
 - For “Industry snapshot” and “Peer Competitors” information, first access the database, then click on the “Companies/Markets” tab and select “Industry”.
- Option B: Use the Mergent database.
 - Either search by industry or type in the name of the main player in your industry. When this company information appears, click on the “competitors” tab. From there you can download a competitors report, research each company listed more in-depth and/or read current articles related to results.
