The virtual community of practice (VCoP) will serve as a platform for empowering faculty to support one another and stay connected to the broader teaching community. Within the VCoP, faculty can harness the power of over 500 experienced instructors as we seek to foster collaborative problem solving around the art and craft of effective teaching and learning.

More specifically, the Franklin Teaching Community is designed so that instructors can:

- support each other and benefit from collective knowledge and experience
- share best practices, techniques, and advice centered on teaching
- dialogue and discuss the latest trends and advances in the fields of teaching and learning
- offer peer-supported solutions to common classroom problems

Yammer is a user-friendly social media platform, which allows for fully threaded discussions, multimedia uploads, tagging and enhance search options. On this platform, each community member can bring unique experiences and diverse expertise that will enrich learning, benefit others, and ultimately contribute to the promotion of teaching excellence at Franklin.

The Franklin Teaching Community will launch in late May/early June, and users will be notified by email when the VCoP becomes available.

**NEW DOCTORAL QUALIFYING COURSE**: June 8 will mark the start of INST585, a new doctoral qualifying course. INST585 will replace the previous INST580 and INST581 courses, and upon successful completion will qualify instructors as both doctoral instructors *and* advisors over one nine-week period. Instructors who have completed one of the two previous courses but who wish to complete both will receive a special opportunity to complete their qualifications during this transition.
