

The new credentialing database, Interfolio, is the central repository for instructor information such as Career Experience, Education, Professional Licensures, Certifications, Awards, Publications, and more.

All faculty have the access and ability to update their information at any time within Interfolio and are encouraged to do so. Updating information will allow students to seek out instructors based on shared professional and research interests and will also facilitate collaboration and connection with colleagues. 

INST 602: Fostering Feedback

Providing specific, actionable, and timely feedback to students is a vital part of quality instruction. However, giving good feedback in an efficient way can be difficult, and many instructors hold the desire to give good feedback in tension with the overwhelming amount of time good feedback can demand.

In INST602, instructors examine current research about student feedback, then explore and multiple methods for providing substantive feedback to students.

The course explores how to give efficient global *and* individual feedback to students, how to save time across courses by streamlining feedback for common errors and mistakes, and multiple tips and techniques for how to integrate video feedback within courses.
