

Instructional Coaching

All adjuncts are encouraged to self-elect into Instructional Coaching in order to develop their teaching skills. Whether they desire to brainstorm new technologies for use in the classroom, figure out a more efficient way to deliver quality feedback, or want to boost their classroom communications, instructors may select a coach at any time to help achieve their pedagogical goals.

Depending on the area selected for improvements, instructors may choose either Tier 1 coaching, which focuses on one instructional area for 1-2 hours, or Tier 2 coaching, which covers multiple foci over the course of four hours. Instructors may request Tier coaching at any time here.

Inclusive Teaching Tip



Active listening is an easy, but significant, step toward inclusion in the classroom.

Listening to students' stories and their preferences can help to establish respect and understanding in the classroom. Even something as simple as listening and then honoring a nickname, or absorbing a students' story about their home or work lives, can set the tone for the learning to follow.

Additionally, listening can also aid instructors in offering support and helping students to accomplish their learning goals. Asking struggling students to share what's behind a missed assignment or a sudden course issue—and then listening, compassionately and without assumptions, to the answer—can help instructors develop meaningful questions and strategize how best to help students while also fostering a sense of belonging and trust.
